

Executive Summary

In the year 2019, Western Philippines University was still under the presidency of Dr. Elsa P. Manarpaac, less than two months before her second term as the University President ends. She nearly achieves all her dreams for the University: to promote the accreditation of courses to higher level; revitalize research, development and extension services; modernize infrastructure; and invigorate administrative and support services.

Academic Affairs

- The University has seven colleges. These are the College of Arts and Sciences (CAS), College of Agriculture, Forestry and Environmental Sciences (CAFES), College of Business and Management (CBM), College of Criminal Justice Education (CCJE), College of Education (CED), College of Engineering and Technology (CET), and College of Fisheries and Aquatic Sciences (CFAS).
- Through the seven colleges, WPU offers three doctorate degrees, eight master's degrees, 20 undergraduate degrees, one post baccalaureate and two pre baccalaureate. Some of these programs are offered in external campuses.
- During AY 2019-2020, 32 degree programs being offered in the three campuses namely: Main Campus, Puerto Princesa City Campus, and Quezon Campus were visited by the AACUP Team of Accreditors. The results of the accreditation showed that one program was on Candidate status; seven were Level 1 Accredited; 18 were Level 2 Re-accredited; five were Level 3 Re-accredited; and one was Level 4 Re-accredited.
- A total of 9,337 students were enrolled in the 1st semester and 8,509 in the 2nd semester, AY 2019-2020.
- There was a total of 1,404 graduates for AY 2019-2020.
- In 2019, the passing rate of WPU graduates in some of the licensure examinations was higher than the national passing rate.
- The University had produced a national topnotcher. Mr. Nerben Dela Rosa Salazar was top 6 in the October 2019 Fisheries Technologist Licensure Examination.
- In 2019, there was a total of 21 accredited student organizations and clubs.
- A total of 28 students taking up agriculture and agriculture-related programs joined the 2019 Agrostudies Internship Program in Israel. The students were earning while they were learning during their On-the-Job Training.

- In 2019, a total of 3,398 students benefited from the different scholarship grants in the University. A total of 3,059 were beneficiaries of the Tertiary Education Subsidy (TES) while 288 were recipients of the Tulong Dunong Program (TDP). TES and TDP are grants from the Commission on Higher Education.
- The Health Services Division through the years serves the university by providing assistance to the WPU students, faculty and staff. In 2019, there was a total of 35,148 individuals who availed of the medical, dental and nursing services of the University.
- The WPU Career Center (WPUCC) took a big leap after the Department of Labor and Employment - MIMAROPA Region approved its accreditation as a Job Placement Office on March 21, 2019.
- WPU was nominated and awarded as a Hero Optimus Awardee on October 27, 2019 by the Board of Directors of Higher Employability Results and Opportunities (HERO), an International Organization based in Singapore.
- WPUCC received a prestigious recognition on October 27, 2019, from Higher Employability Results and Opportunities (HERO) Encore, an international organization based in Ottawa, Canada. Such recognition was given to schools, whose performance in creating ecology of highly employable graduates and prioritizing students' success has been exemplar for years.
- The Bangko Sentral ng Pilipinas–Knowledge Resources Network was launched at the WPU Puerto Princesa City Campus Library. The launching and MOA signing between the University and the Knowledge Resources Network of the Bangko Sentral ng Pilipinas was made on March 12, 2019.
- During the Annual General Assembly of the Philippine Librarians Association Inc. at Tagaytay International Convention on November 19-22, 2019, the WPU library personnel took time to build linkages with other librarians and exchange the university journal, The Palawan Scientist with the journals from other universities.
- WPU hosted the 1st Regional Tertiary Education (TES) Congress on November 7-8, 2019 at WPU Puerto Princesa City Campus.
- WPU holds annual sports competitions through the University Olympics in the different campuses to develop physical wellness, sportsmanship, unity, teamwork, and camaraderie among the students.
- The university also participated and placed 8th in the 2019 STRASUC Olympics hosted by Romblon State University, Odiongan, Romblon on November 22-27, 2019.

- WPU hosted the 5th STRASUC Culture and the Arts Festival 2019 at the WPU Puerto Princesa City Campus, Sta. Monica, Puerto Princesa City on November 11-14, 2019 with the theme “Celebrating Diversity of Cultural Expressions”
- The University maintains two performing arts groups - the WPU Himigyaw at the Main Campus and the WPU-PPC Performing Arts Troupe (Marching Band, Acoustic Band, Chorale Group, Cultural and Dance Troupe) in WPU Puerto Princesa City Campus.

Research and Development

- As envisioned to be the leading knowledge center for sustainable development of West Philippines and beyond, WPU also achieved excellence in the field of research. In 2019, it had come up with four programs, 47 projects and 130 studies. It had 22 publications and several paper presentations of which 38 papers were presented in international fora, two in regional and 16 in local levels.
- The Palawan Scientist, an open-access, refereed research journal of WPU, released its 11th Volume in July, 2019. It is an externally peer-reviewed multi-disciplinary journal published by the Western Philippines University, Aborlan, Palawan, Philippines. It aims to publish high quality and original researches in the fields of agriculture, fisheries and aquatic sciences, environment, education, engineering, mathematics, sociology and related disciplines (to include arts and humanities).
- Articles published in The Palawan Scientist are now indexed in the Web of Science. Web of Science is an online subscription-based scientific citation indexing service originally produced by the Institute for Scientific Information, later maintained by Clarivate Analytics, that provides a comprehensive citation search.
- WPU, as partner member agency (PMA), signed a MOA on March 11, 2019 to formalize its collaboration with the DA-Agricultural Training Institute Regional Training Center MIMAROPA on Techno Gabay Program-FITS.
- DOST Secretary Fortunato Dela Pena and DOST-MIMAROPA Regional Director Dr. Ma. Josefina P. Abilay visited the Palawan Innovation Fabrication Laboratory at WPU Puerto Princesa City Campus on November 29, 2019.
- WPU hosted two Balik Scientist Program Awardees, Dr. Christopher Marlowe A. Caipang and Dr. Hernando P. Bacosa.

- John Bryan C. Villapa, an engineering student, presented “Geopolymerization Method to Modify the Structural Properties of Stabilized Silty Clay Utilizing Coconut Husk Ash, Rice Husk Ash, and Sea Water for Wall Construction” (Oral) during the International Scientific Conference on Engineering and Applied Sciences on June 3-7, 2019 at the Royal Plaza, Hongkong.

Extension Services

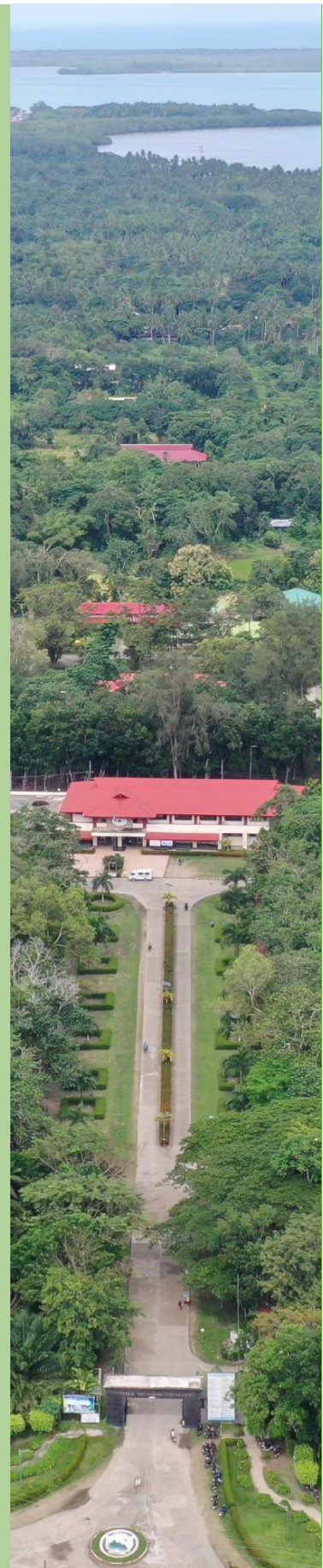
- On the extension services, WPU has 22 projects approved by the Board of Regents. In 2019, through the seven colleges, it had trained 4,141.75 trainees weighted by the length of training.

Administration and Support Services

- The total budget of WPU in 2019 was Php 244,272,001.90. The budget allocated for Personal Services (PS) was Php 211,376,594.00, for Maintenance and Other Operating Expenses (MOOE) was Php 11,418,327.36 and for Capital Outlay was Php 11, 418, 327.36.
- At the end of 2019, WPU had 23 infrastructure projects being implemented through the Physical Plant Office, 21 of which were completed, one was ongoing and another one with Occupancy Permit was still on process.
- For the CY 2019, WPU had three projects categorized as agriculture-based projects, non-agriculture-based projects and auxiliary projects. Under the agriculture-based projects, there were three sub projects namely: crops project, animal project and agri-fishery project.
- A total of 645 faculty and staff members comprised the university workforce in 2019.
- The General Administration and Support Services (GASS) and Research Services passed the Surveillance Audit and recommended for continuous certification of ISO 9001:2015 Quality Management System.
- WPU received an Award of Recognition from Government Quality Management Committee-Department of Budget and Management for obtaining original ISO 9001:2015 certification during the 7th Recognition Ceremony and Public Sector Quality and Productivity Improvement Forum on October 24, 2019 at Philippine International Convention Center.
- WPU received the award “2019 Most Sustainable and Eco-Friendly School for MIMAROPA” on November 6, 2019 at the Philippine Information Agency (PIA) Auditorium, Quezon City.
- WPU was awarded a plaque as Most Active Academe Partner in Job Fairs during the “Afternoon Delight with SITEL” on March 29, 2019 at SITEL, Puerto Princesa City.

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About the University

Brief History

Western Philippines University traces its history back to 1910 when the American teachers, the Thomasites, founded the Aborlan Farm Settlement School for the Tagbanuas, one of the indigenous groups in the province of Palawan. Only after six years of its establishment did its doors open to non-Tagbanuas. Its focus on agriculture led to its conversion to Aborlan Agricultural High School (AAHS) in 1928. It offered subjects such as Farm Arithmetic, Field Work, and Horticulture. It also offered Literature, Composition, and Physical Education. Eventually, in 1960, the AAHS was converted into a national regional agricultural school and became known as the Palawan National Regional Agricultural School (PNRAS) by virtue of RA 2619.



Since PNRAS served largely the province of Palawan, it was renamed Palawan National Agricultural School (PNAS) in 1962. A year after, on June 22, 1963, PNAS was converted into the Palawan National Agricultural College (PNAC) by virtue of RA 3648. Its conversion authorized PNAC to offer courses leading to associate degrees in agriculture and agricultural education, bachelor degrees in agriculture, agricultural education, home economics, and also Master of Science with majors in agricultural sciences and Master of Agricultural Education.





It was during this time when PNAC established the internationally awarded Bayanihan School Program, a recipient of the *Pro Patria Award* and the *Ramon Magsaysay Award*, in recognition of the services it rendered to more than 2,000 out of school youth and farmers through the Bayanihan Centers in Barong-barong, Abo-abo, Calasaguen, and Samariñana in Brooke's Point; Magsaysay and San Jose in Dumarang; Bucana, Sibaltan, and Teneguiban in El Nido; Candawaga in Rizal; Antipuluan, Princess

Urduja, Calategas, and Malatgao in Narra; Salvacion in Puerto Princesa City; Aramaywan, Quinlogan, and Tagusao in Quezon; Mendoza and San Jose in Roxas; and Abongan, Busybees, and Magsaysay in Taytay. These Bayanihan Centers were the forerunners of the present national high schools in the said areas.



Palawan National Agricultural College was converted to State Polytechnic College of Palawan (SPCP) on May 25, 1995 by virtue of RA 8012. It further authorized SPCP to offer other courses in arts, sciences and technology, and other courses that are consistent with local, regional, and national development. On March 5, 2004,

SPCP was converted to a full-fledged university with the enactment of RA 9260 and became Western Philippines University (WPU). More relevant courses were offered; professional development of its faculty and staff was revitalized; and new and stronger linkages with partner institutions were established.

In 2013, WPU was recognized by the Accrediting Agency of Chartered Colleges and Universities in the Philippines (AACUP), Inc. as one of the Top Performing SUCS based on the number of programs awarded accreditation status by levels.

In 2015, in recognition of its environmental advocacy, WPU won awards from the Department of Environment and Natural Resources and Commission on Higher Education. The University was a National Finalist and declared Regional Winner in the National Search for Sustainable and Eco-friendly Schools in MIMAROPA



Region (Tertiary Level) and also received the MERALCO Energy Leadership Award- the same awards it previously won in 2013, 2015 and 2017 and Nestle Water Leadership Award- the same award it won in 2017. In 2017, WPU was finally recognized as a national winner for grabbing the Second Place in the nationwide competition. In 2019, WPU received the award “2019 Most Sustainable and Eco-Friendly School for MIMAROPA.

Major milestones were achieved when Puerto Princesa City Campus was designated as a Center of Excellence in Fisheries and as a National College/University of Fisheries (NUCF) while the Main Campus was designated as National College/University of Agriculture (NUCA). WPU was also designated as Regional Center for Information and Communications Technology, Regional Center for Vermiculture and Vermimeal Production, Affiliated Renewable Energy Center (AREC) and Provincial Center for Human Rights Education by the Commission on Higher Education and Commission on Human Rights.

WPU has gone a long way in its more than one hundred years of existence. From being a humble farm settlement school in 1910, WPU has evolved into a prime mover, a leader, in sustainable development in Western Philippines and beyond through relevant instruction, research, and extension services. Its name has become synonymous with environmental protection and green technology, enabling more people to lead a better life.

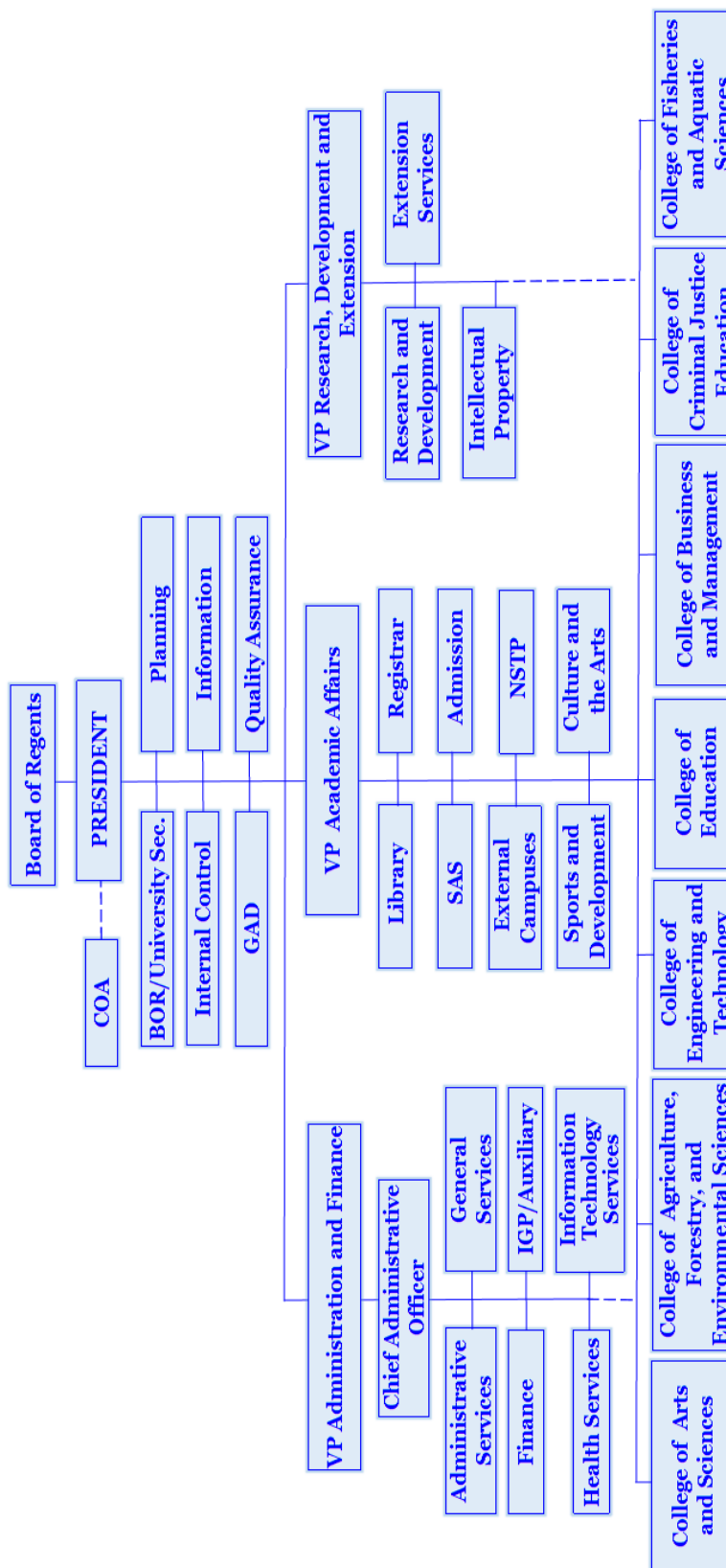

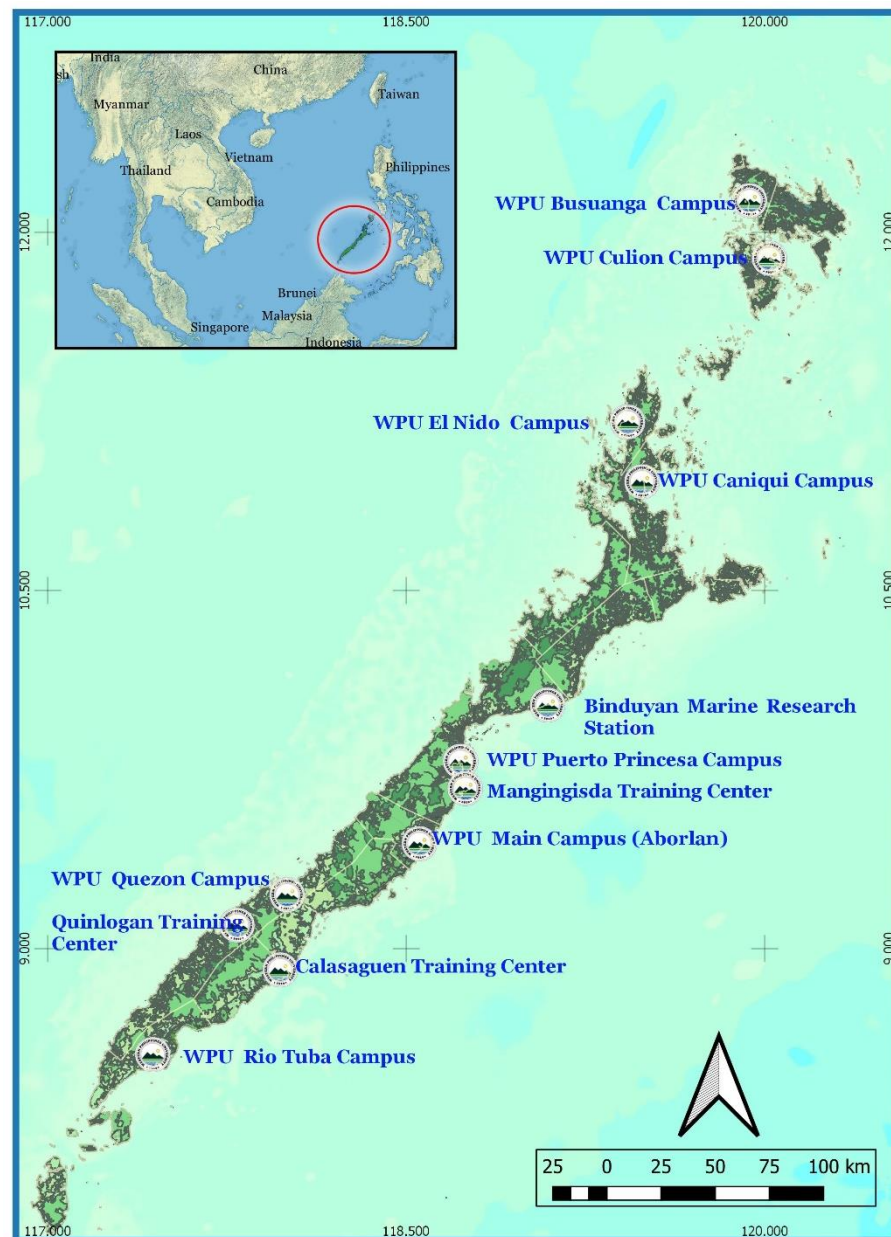
WPU Organizational Structure

Areas of Service

The Main Campus of Western Philippines University is located in Aborlan, Palawan. It has a major campus in Puerto Princesa City which offers courses in fisheries and aquatic biology. In response to requests from local government units to provide higher education to their constituents, WPU established campuses in Quezon (2003), Busuanga (2003), Culion (2003) and El Nido (2004). There are two extension schools: Rio Tuba in Bataraza (2004) and Canique in Taytay (2011); three training centers: Quinlogan in Quezon, Calasaguen in Brooke's Point, and Mangingisda in Puerto Princesa City; and one marine research station in Binduyan, Puerto Princesa City.

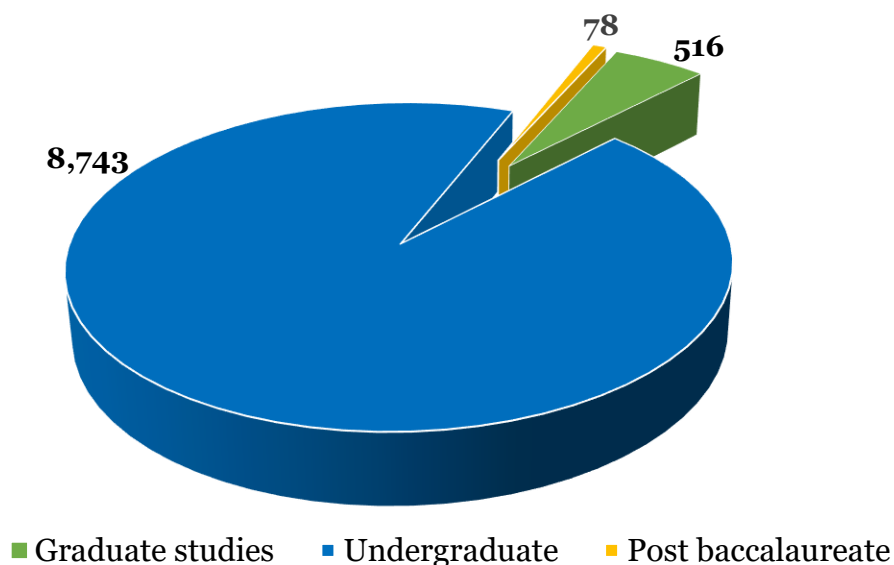

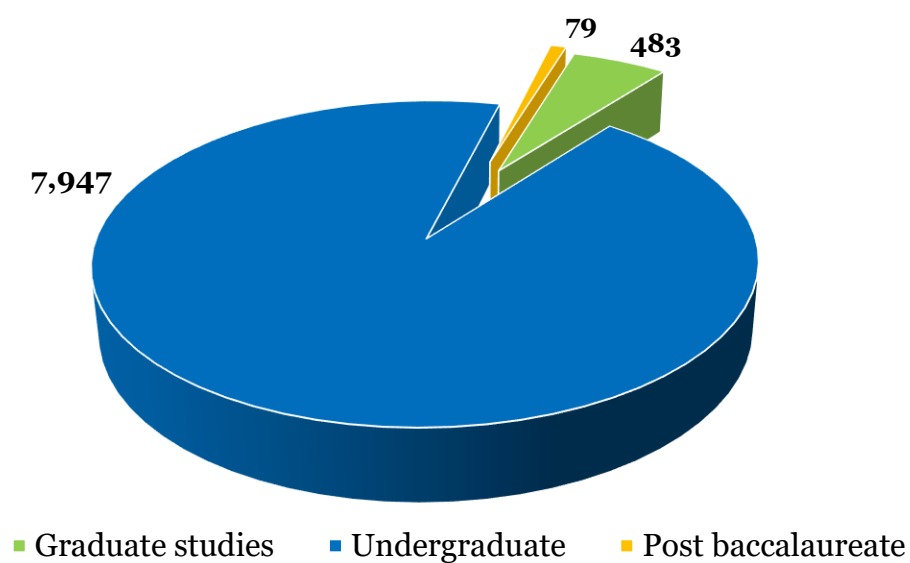
Enrollment and Graduation Trends

As to the enrollment for the first semester of AY 2019-2020, 8,743 were enrolled in the undergraduate, 516 in the graduate and 78 in the post baccalaureate with a total of 9,337 enrollees. While for the second semester of AY 2019-2020, 7,947 were enrolled in the undergraduate, 483 in the graduate and 79 in the post- baccalaureate with a total of 8,509. It is shown that the enrollment during the second semester decreased by 828.

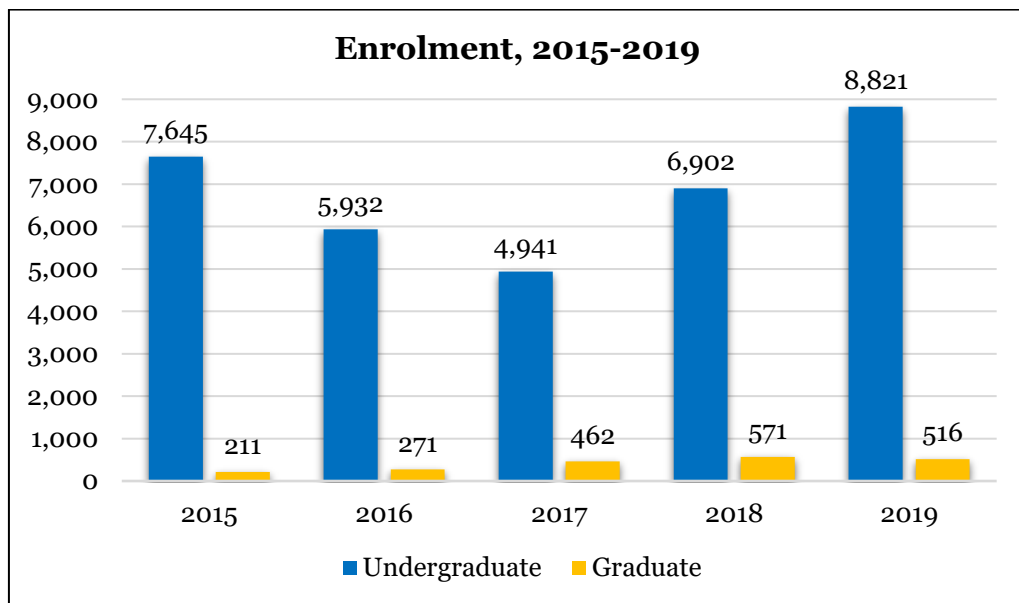
No. of enrollees (1st Semester, AY 2019-2020)



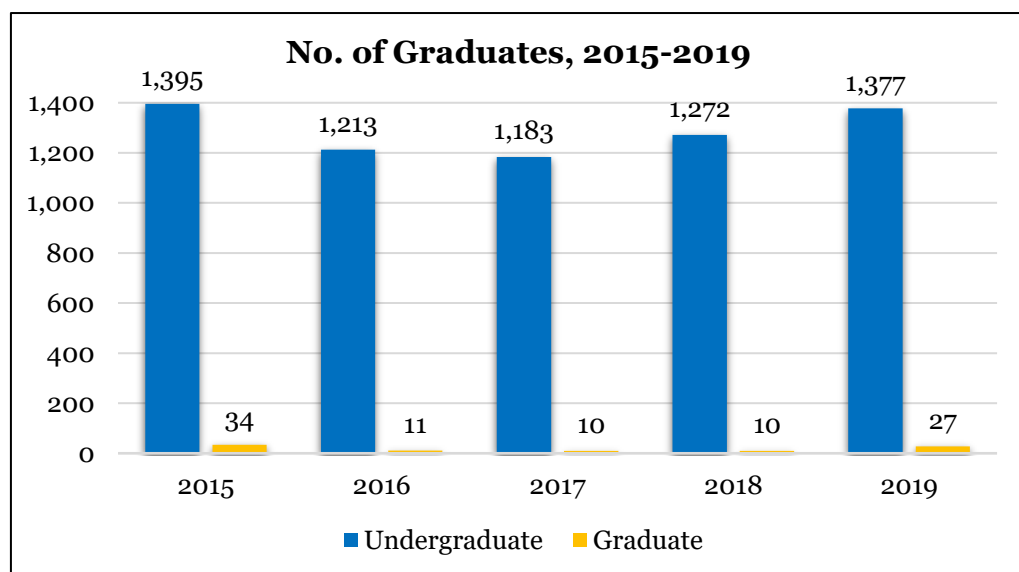
No. of enrollees (2nd Semester, AY 2019-2020)



Looking at the trend of enrollment in the last five years, the total enrollment in the undergraduate in 2015 was 7,645 which decreased to 5,932 in 2016 and 4,941 in 2017. There was a downward trend in the enrollment rate in the undergraduate in the two successive years due the implementation of the K to 12 Curriculum where the graduates of Junior High School are required to go through Senior High School before they can proceed to college. The enrollment increased again to 6,902 in 2018 and 8,821 in 2019. This is because the first batch of graduates of the Senior High School started to enroll in college. In the graduate, the total enrollment in 2015 was 211 which increased to 271 in 2016, 462 in 2017, 571 in 2018 and 516 in 2019. There was an increasing trend in the enrollment rate in the graduate in the four successive years.



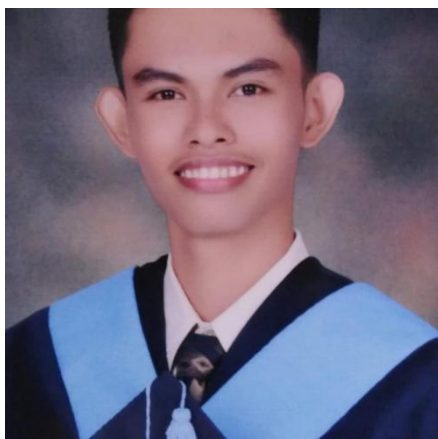
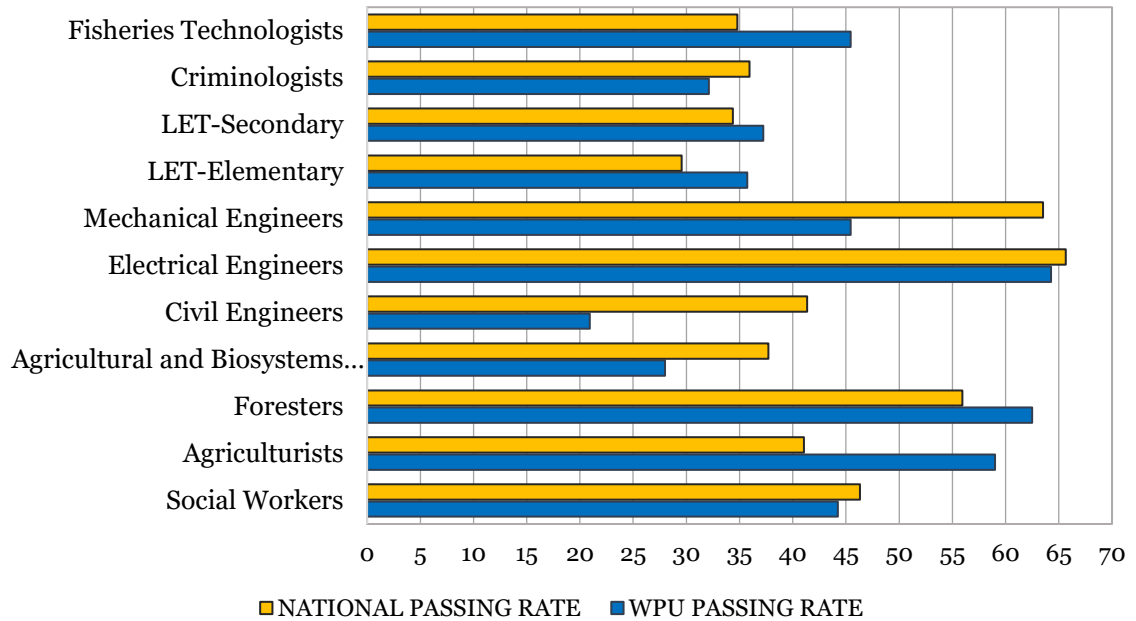
The number of graduates for the last five years in the undergraduate ranged from 1,183 to 1,395 while in the graduate, it ranged from 10 to 34. WPU has an average of 1,306 graduates annually.

The Career Center

WPU Career Center (WPUCC) is one of the programs initiated by United States Agency for International Development (USAID) – Science, Technology, Research and Innovation for Development (STRIDE) through the Learning Systems Institute (LSI) – Florida State University (FSU). On its third year of existence, several activities were conducted to help students realize their career goals.

Year 2019 unfolded remarkable breakthroughs for WPU Career Center. Evidently, it took a big leap after the Department of Labor and Employment – MIMAROPA Region approved its accreditation as a Job Placement Office on March 21, 2019, through a Memorandum of Agreement signed between WPU, represented by President Elsa P. Manarpaac, and OIC-Director Joel M. Gonzales in behalf of DOLE-MIMAROPA Region. This MOA further led to bigger opportunities for our university stakeholders who gained increased advantage from this unification. The merger paved better chances for the students, alumni and the community to become part of succeeding DOLE programs and services such as Philippine Talent Map Initiative (PTMI), Career Guidance and Employment Coaching (CGEC), Special Program for Employment of Students (SPES), proposal for Livelihood Programs affiliating WPUCC as an Accredited Co-Partner (ACP) and Philjobnet (official DOLE job portal) access through the Skills Registry System (SRS), and several other DOLE-initiated platforms in the forthcoming times.

During the 1st Federation Meeting of Palawan PESO Managers held in Puerto Princesa City, WPU Career Center was chosen to host Labor Day Celebration 2019 which offered 363 registered employment seekers promising jobs in the labor market. A total of 36 local and overseas agencies took part in the event. Job Fair Report identified 25 applicants Hired On The Spot (HOTS),

208 jobseekers categorized For Further Interview (FFI) and 11 aspirants referred to TESDA for Skills Training. This Labor Day Celebration back to back with the Department of Trade and Industry's (DTI) Livelihood Summit was known and cited by DOLE as the first of its kind outside Puerto Princesa City. WPU, through its Career Center, truly acknowledged bestowed trust and confidence by industry y-partners which posted greater employment prospects for Aborlanons and the rest of Southern Palawan jobseekers.

WPU Career Center (WPUCC) was invited to share its experiences and operational methodologies during the 6th Regional Career Advocacy Congress (RCAC) held in Manila. Indeed, a favorable time to showcase entirety of its structure and undertakings to the rest of affiliate organizations within MIMAROPA region. The rare chance opened new ties among colleagues in this field of helping people gain access to suitable employment.

Benchmarking activities from both private and government schools like Marikina Polytechnic College and Mindoro State College of Agriculture and Technology (MINS CAT) transpired. Their curiosity regarding WPUCC start-ups truly inspired WPUCC to pursue higher grounds while sharing its humble beginnings. It was a notable period highlighted by "University visit and Career Talk" with SHS graduating students from Narra National High School whose enthusiasm gave further encouragement to expand and continue serving the community shareholders.

Finally, WPUCC received a prestigious recognition on October 27, 2019, from Higher Employability Results and Opportunities (HERO) Encore, an international organization based in Ottawa, Canada. It was an occasion which accentuated the remaining quarter of 2019. Such recognition was given to schools whose performance in creating ecology of highly-employable graduates and prioritizing students' success has been exemplar for years. WPU President Elsa P. Manarpaac, together with Vice President for Academic Affairs Julie Hope Timotea P. Evina, Career Center Director Ruth J. Kutat, and Job Placement Officer Maricarh B. Bobilles, witnessed and accepted the recognition at Manila Peninsula Hotel.



In the succeeding years, WPU Career Center undertakes to continue what it has started, with the sponsorship of partner-industries both from government and private sectors, WPUCC will continue to hold true to its mission: “*Bridging opportunities from enrolment to employment*”.

Library Services

The University Library aims to provide efficient and effective library services to the University personnel, students, and other authorized clientele. It also aims for continuous enrichment of the library resources.

Through the relentless efforts of the WPU librarians, a number of linkages with other academic libraries were established. The launching and MOA signing between the University and the Knowledge Resources Network of the Bangko Sentral ng Pilipinas was made on March 12, 2019.

During the Annual General Assembly of the Philippine Librarians Association Inc. at Tagaytay International Convention on November 19-22, 2019, the WPU library personnel took time to build linkage with other librarians and exchange the university journal, The Palawan Scientist with the journals from other universities.

As envisioned to be the leading knowledge center for sustainable development of West Philippines and beyond, WPU also achieved excellence in the field of research. In 2019, it has come up with 4 programs, 47 projects, and 130 studies. It had 22 publications and several paper presentations of which 38 papers were presented in international fora, 2 in regional and 16 in local levels.

The Palawan Scientist, an open-access, refereed research journal of WPU, released its 11th Volume in July, 2019. It is an externally peer-reviewed multi-disciplinary journal published by the Western Philippines University, Aborlan, Palawan, Philippines. It aims to publish high quality and original researches in the fields of agriculture, fisheries and aquatic sciences, environment, education, engineering, mathematics, sociology and related disciplines (to include arts and humanities).

Articles published in The Palawan Scientist are now indexed in the Web of Science. Web of Science is an online subscription-based scientific citation indexing service originally produced by the Institute for Scientific Information, later maintained by Clarivate Analytics, that provides a comprehensive citation search.

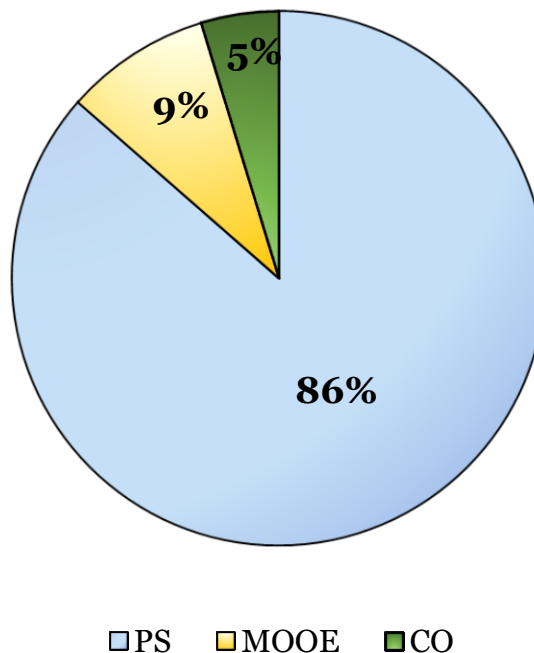

Income Generating and Auxiliary Projects

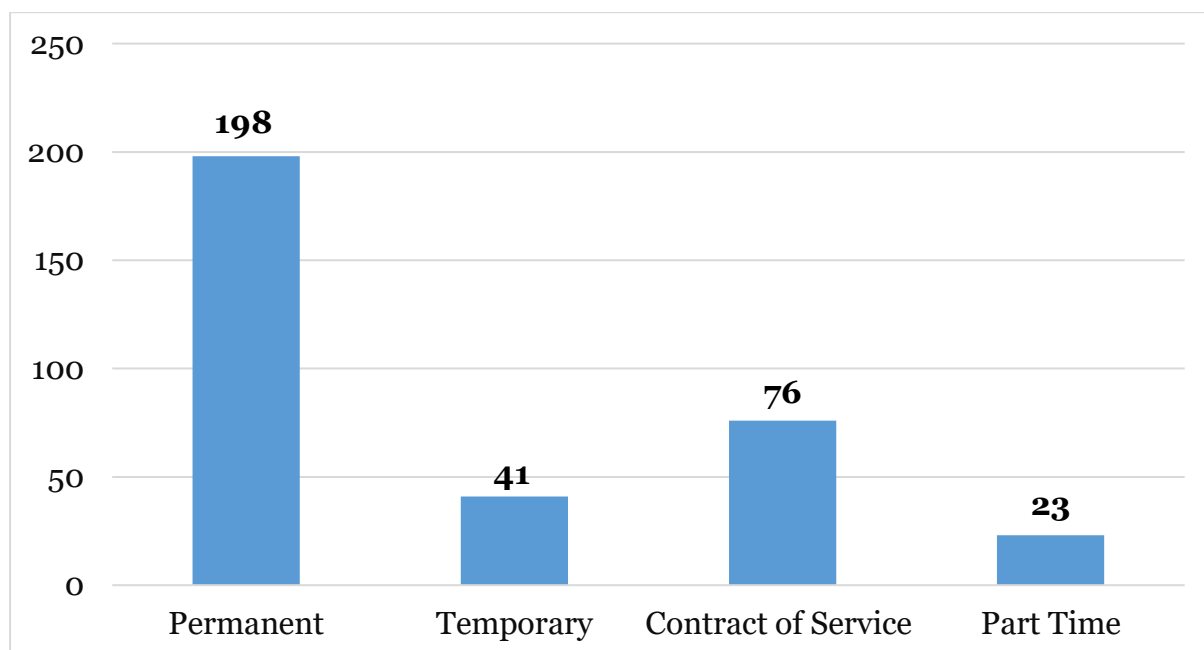

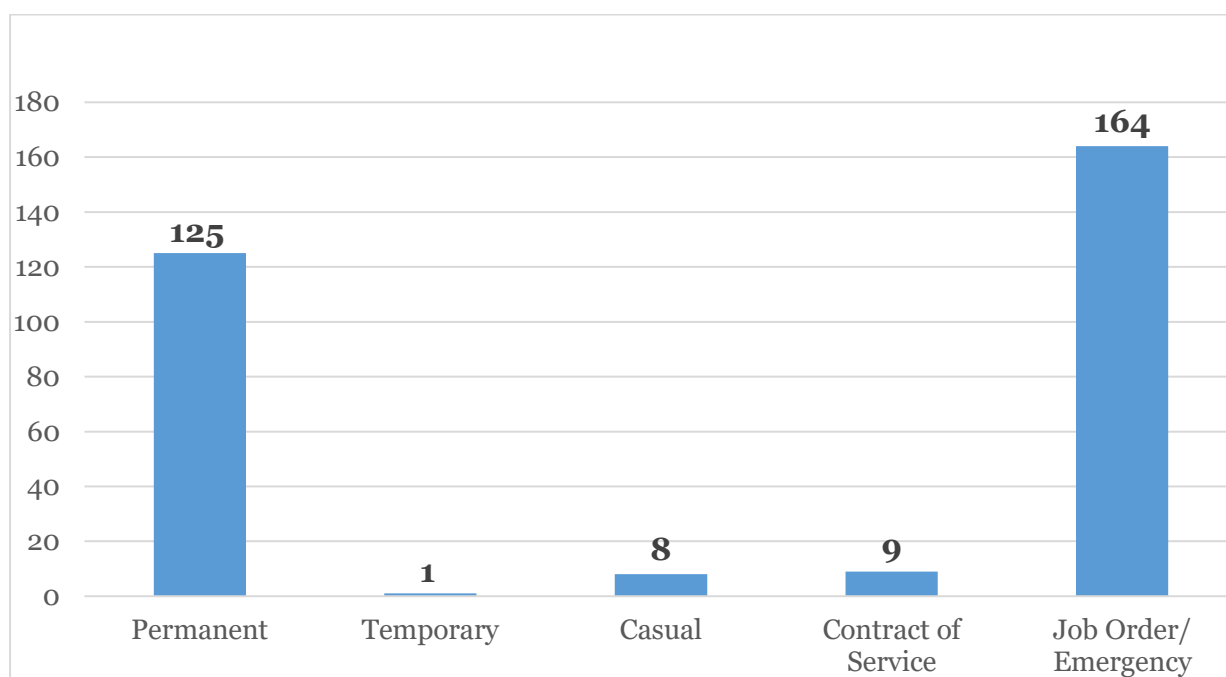
